Dr. Paul Janssen Chair in Psychotic Disorders: Dr. Phil Tibbo

Currently the Janssen Chair is on a six-month sabbatical (Jan.–June 2025 inclusive) to allow some more time to focus on research endeavours, write/read, reflect and future visioning. The 2024 year saw 21 publications from the Chair's research group and collaborators, with the focus on psychotic disorders and comorbid substance use. Seeing the graduate students publish their research is always satisfying. Mental health

research grant funding/support struggles in Canada and will be a concern moving forward. However, the Chair has recently secured funding to continue work on cannabis and psychosis, in addition to service delivery research. Of note, the Chair was part of a large international team who recently received funding from Welcome Trust (valued at over 9 million CAN), "Understanding disorganization: A language focused global initiative in *psychosis.*" Additionally, the Chair continues to speak on his group's work, most recently as an invited speaker at a cannabis policy summit in Washington, D.C. (Feb. 2025). A number of abstracts have also been already accepted early in 2025 for two leading psychosis conferences, that being the Schizophrenia International Research Society annual meeting (April) and the International Early Intervention in Psychiatry conference in September.

Young voices from Nova Scotia shape global conversations at international conference

At this year's 7th International Association of Youth Mental Health (IAYMH) conference held in Vancouver, two young leaders from Nova Scotia, 21-year-old Robyn Black and 18-year-old Luther Stronach spoke with global audiences through their compelling

presentations on valuing youth voice in developing Nova Scotia's Integrated Youth Services (IYS).

Robyn, an IYS Youth Advisory Council member and research assistant in Dr. **Lori Wozney**'s lab, shared initial results from a Phase 1 photo-elicitation study funded by Canadian Institutes of Health Research and complimentary work with Dr. **Linda Liebenberg**'s Spaces and Places research. Robyn detailed themes co-developed with youth in two communities involved in the study and facilitated an interactive mini photo-elicitation activity for session attendees. Luther, also a member of the Provincial IYS Youth Advisory Council from Kingston, presented on the ways in which IYS acts as a navigational beacon for youth and the caregivers of youth facing mental health challenges. Luther shared personal experiences in navigating supports and contrasted rural and urban experiences of youth. His talk illuminated how "solving" mental health is not a one-time event but something communities need to evolve over time.

Daphne Hutt-MacLeod the Director of IYS Nova Scotia who attended the presentations, noted: "It was so fulfilling to see the confidence and poise of our young people sharing key findings, networking and pushing for social justice. Not only did they contribute novel east-coast research to the global conversation but their message — that youth need to be co-designers and co-creators of the services they use-was stronger coming from them than anything people could have said on their behalf."

The conference had close to 1000 delegates from 48 countries.

DaRT program survey study

Hello colleagues,

Trauma training and service needs. I need your help!

Complex Trauma involves repeated exposure to trauma experiences, especially during childhood. Relational trauma can result in Complex PTSD, a new diagnosis that has the clinical features of PTSD including re-experiencing symptoms, as well as symptoms that reflect the prolonged impact of sustained trauma on self and interpersonal relationships.

CPTSD is a challenge to treat. Exposure to relational trauma is commonly found among individuals seeking mental health support, and associated with high levels of comorbidity with other mental health concerns including depression and anxiety disorders.

As clinicians, we believe we can all greatly benefit from having a solid foundation for recognizing and treating this disorder.

The DaRT program designed a survey study to examine mental

health clinicians' self-reported knowledge/training and experience in identifying and treating Complex PTSD in their clinical work with adult clients. The intention is to identify areas in which further education, training, and systemic support for clinicians could assist the successful treatment and healing of clients with relational trauma.

We are asking clinicians from across the province who provide care to adults within Nova Scotia's Mental Health & Addictions programs to take a few minutes to complete a brief survey about treating traumarelated disorders.

- The survey includes 34 multiplechoice questions
- The survey is anonymous
- It takes less than 15 minutes to complete
- The results will inform future education, training, and the development of system supports to enhance care and capacity for treating individuals with

complex trauma throughout Nova Scotia.

CAP RESEARCH

CAP research highlight

The **CALM** Study is A Randomized Placebo-Controlled Trial of Sertraline vs. Placebo in the Treatment of Anxiety in ChiLdren and Adolescents with NeurodevelopMental Disorders (NDDs).

Led by pediatric neurologist and senior clinician scientist Dr. Evdokia Anagnostou of Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital (University of Toronto), the research study will be conducted at eight different sites across Canada, including the IWK Health Centre. This study is a collaboration between Pediatrics and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, with Dr. Megan Thomas as site qualified investigator, and co-investigators Drs. Sarah Shea, Isabel Smith and **Lukas Propper**.

The CALM study is a 16-week trial to evaluate the efficacy and safety of sertraline in the treatment of comorbid anxiety disorders in children and adolescents with NDDs including autism spectrum disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, tic disorders, or genetic diagnosis of fragile X, tuberous sclerosis or 22q11 deletions, as use of this medication remains unexplored in this population.

A basket design will be utilized with the aim of assessing feasibility of recruiting sixteen suitable participants locally (130 across all sites) and their compliance with study protocol. To be eligible, participants must be aged 8-17 and will undergo extensive screening including diagnostic and cognitive assessments prior to randomization to sertraline or a placebo. Regular follow-up over 16-weeks will take place to assess tolerability and safety.

This study will address a significant gap in the literature by providing foundational data that can inform future trials and ultimately improve treatment strategies for comorbid anxiety in children and adolescents with NDDs.

Section of **Community Psychiatry**

We have been actively advertising and recruiting to fill positions created by retirements and the erosion of FTEs over the years. a greater understanding of the diverse needs of aging populations across different geographic regions and inspire future geriatric psychiatrists to consider careers that support underserved communities.



The scope for the One Person One Record Clinical Information System (OPOR-CIS) is vast and varied across the healthcare system and will impact nearly every area of patient care. The initial implementation will begin with IWK Health and then roll out across Nova Scotia Health facilities and sites over 18 months.

After consultation and many discussions with Nova Scotia Health primary health care leadership. it was decided that primary care clinics would not be included until the completion of the OPOR-CIS implementation. Once implemented across acute care, the OPOR Program will continue to work with Nova Scotia Health primary health care teams and partners to finalize design and scope, including virtual care. Chronic disease management clinics are included in the first implementation timeline and will golive with their IWK Health and Nova Scotia Health sites.

Consultation with Nova Scotia Health primary health care teams and partners, along with the implementation of the CIS in other acute care ambulatory services, will inform the future design. This is an important step in ensuring we have the right system features to properly serve primary health care.

OPOR Town Halls continue the fourth Wednesday of each month, open to all Nova Scotia Health and IWK Health employees/physicians. Town Halls provide a platform to discuss the OPOR vision, and share insights, creating a collaborative environment that promotes readiness and shared ownership throughout the transformation journey.

Centre for Global Mental Health

The Centre for Global Mental Health is a new Dalhousie research centre promoting Global Mental Health education, research, and knowledge translation.

Masters in Global Clinical Psychiatry (pending MPHEC approval)

The Masters in Global Clinical Psychiatry is a part-time, online masters program designed to enhance mental healthcare delivery globally through advanced education in clinical psychiatry. The program emphasizes cultural competence, evidence-based practice, and practical skills development.

The Centre for Global Mental Health and Masters in Global Clinical Psychiatry were key elements of our department's transformational and strategic plan and will significantly enhance the department's leadership in closing treatment gaps globally.

In January 2025, Dr. **Mutiat Sulyman**, a psychiatrist and director of EDIA for the Department of Psychiatry, delivered a capacitybuilding session for volunteers and staff of the Asido Foundation in Old-Bodija Estate, Ibadan, Nigeria.

During the session, Dr. Sulyman shared her experiences in her career path, particularly the disparities and inequalities in access to equitable and affordable mental health care. This underscored the need for the government, NGOs, and civil society organizations to prioritize mental health.

Dr. Sulyman also discussed her passion for ensuring that individuals with intellectual disabilities who are especially vulnerable receive the care they need. This passion has significantly influenced her professional journey as a psychiatrist. She emphasized the urgent need for mental health advocacy to improve public perception and reduce the stigma and shame associated with mental health conditions, especially in Nigeria and across Africa.

Finally, she shared insights on the benefits of volunteering, aiming to inspire and encourage all volunteers to become more involved and support the foundation's efforts in promoting optimal mental wellbeing for everyone. She commended the foundation's work and discussed potential opportunities for collaboration and partnership to enhance and amplify the impact of the Asido Foundation in the field of mental health. She also stressed on the importance of self-care as a volunteer and community mental health champion.

Dr. Pippa Moss' update on the Fundy Peace Foundation's work in Kenya

Dr. Pippa Moss recently returned from Kenya, having visited the projects there run through The Fundy Peace Foundation (fundypeace.com). The four children in Nakuru, who started life as AIDs orphaned and abandoned babies with complex medical needs and who have been adopted and fostered into a local family, are all doing well. The older two will be in their final year of schooling soon and plan to go on to study nursing and plumbing. Many thanks to their aunties and uncles here in Canada who have sponsored and cared for them from infancy, as well as those who give spontaneously. This has literally saved their lives.

Having spent the last 14 years ensuring that these children are healthy and well cared for, overcoming initial problems such as starvation, cerebral palsy and cardiac defects, we now face a huge challenge. The cuts to US foreign aid mean that the supply of antiretroviral medications, needed to keep some of the family alive, is in question. We will know more in April when the next medical appointments are due.

The oldest boy in the family, now an adult, has schizophrenia and we are still looking for an individual or small group to sponsor him and ensure that his depot medications are covered. There is very little mental health care available in Kenya and we have been extremely fortunate to find a psychiatrist who follows his progress locally.

The other projects, in the Masai Mara, are also doing well. Having the local population at Empoo enumerated (by a young man who went through school and teacher training under our care) has meant that the politicians are now playing a role in road and school maintainance. And the government

has promised to staff a clinic/ inpatient unit if we can build it, as lives are being lost when health care cannot be accessed, especially in the rainy seasons. The walls are going up, a bit at a time as funds are raised.

Children are being registered at birth now they can attend school. We built the school for girls, though boys are welcome to attend, and hope that by ensuring this education, at least to Grade 7, we will counter local traditions such as child brides and female genital The water supply for drinking established in partnership with AMREF, after we put in the borehole. mutilation, which are (theoretically) illegal in Kenya.
